Work on the building to begin in 30 days.
Some of the buildings will cost \$15,000.

THE BOARD DECIDED IN FAVOR OF LAFAYETTE.
 THE VOTE STOOD 5 AGAINST 2. THE LATTER ONES, PROF. BROWN AYRES AND JAMES E. LEE, WERE IN FAVOR OF NEW IBERIA.
 IBERIA OFFERED A SITE OF 50 ACRES AND \$5,000.
 LAFAYETTE OFFERED A SITE OF 25 ACRES AND \$8,000 AND \$10,000 ADVANCED BY THE LOCAL BANKS ON FIRST TWO YEARS TAXES.
 SCOTT OFFERED A SITE AND \$7,250.
 The school will be built in about thirty or 40 days.
 The site chosen is the one given by Mrs. M. E. Girard and her son Mr. Crow Girard, near their plantation at close proximity of Lafayette.

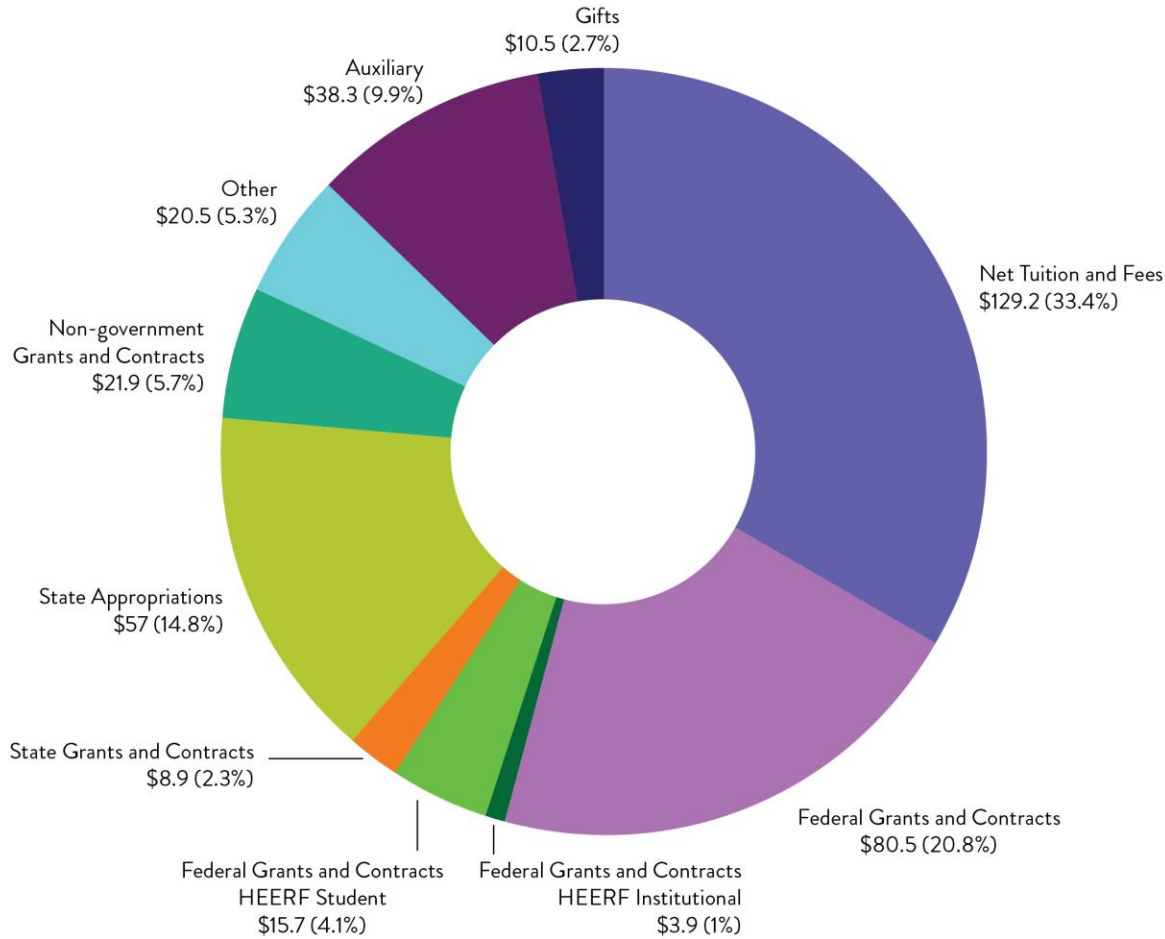




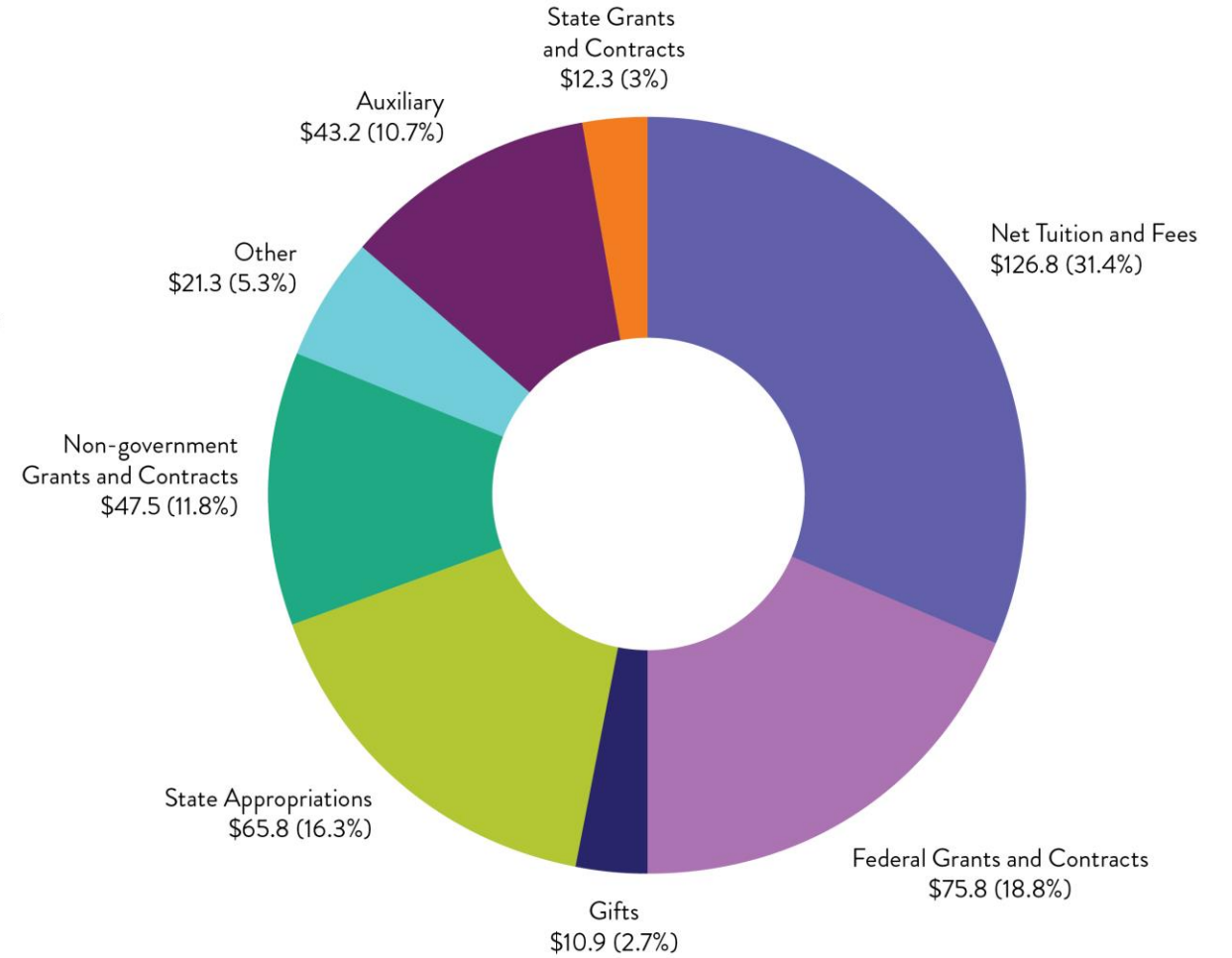




OVERALL REVENUES

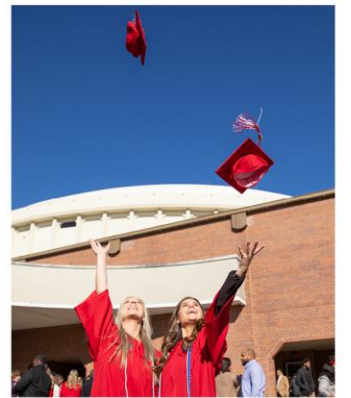

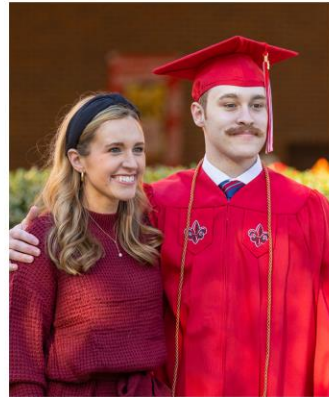
