Last week, I had the privilege of attending the SREB Institute on Teaching and Mentoring, along with a stellar group of our PhD fellows, faculty members, and several of our academic college deans. The Institute never fails to energize me, and this year was no exception. We left feeling inspired, uplifted, and reminded of the shared purpose that unites us in a journey of education and mentorship.

The Institute opened with a reminder that was simple: "Don't only shoot for the moon; shoot to get home." I've thought much about that message in the days that followed. In academia, it's easy to get caught up in a race for external validation but, ultimately, the goal is to become deeply grounded in your own purpose and to grow even beyond the graduate degrees we seek.

Throughout the conference, we were encouraged to embrace courage, find joy in our work, and lean deeply into the commitments we've made. As grad students, researchers, and educators, each of us has taken on a path that's often rigorous, unpredictable, and sometimes exhausting. But there is also immense beauty in this process—the chance to make a meaningful impact, to learn alongside others, and to do work that resonates with the world around us.

In reflecting on these themes, here are a few takeaways that especially hit home for me:

Grace, gratitude, and laughter—the world needs more of these three things. Extend them to others and, especially, to yourself.
The people who succeed often go deep, not wide. Invest in

mastering the deep knowledge that matters to you.

- Your best work is done *after you've had time to rest*. Prioritize time for renewal.
- Most importantly, *know the power of your voice*. It's needed, respected, and valued here.

This time in grad school is precious. Stay curious, celebrate even the smallest of wins, and take each step with confidence. Keep supporting one another and move your passion forward with courage and joy.

CREATIVITY, INNOVATION, AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP GRADUATE STUDENT RESEARCH AWARDS

In Spring 2024, Professor Josh Bendickson, the Brauns-Oudenhoven-Boustany Eminent Scholar and Endowed Chair in Innovation & Entrepreneurship, issued an open call for research proposals across the UL Lafayette campus, seeking projects focused on Creativity, Innovation, and Entrepreneurship. The initiative showcases cutting-edge research at UL Lafayette and build a community of scholars passionate about advancing these fields within Louisiana and beyond.

A total of \$36,000 in funding was awarded across 18 projects, which included both faculty and graduate student proposals. We're especially excited to highlight seven graduate students whose projects were selected for funding, a testament to the impactful work happening within our graduate education community. These faculty and graduate researchers will present their work at the Inn-eaux-vate Louisiana Conference on Feb. 7, 2025 at the LITE Center.

Signs of Imposter Syndrome

- Feeling like achievements are due to luck, not ability
- Doubting skills despite positive feedback
- Fear of not living up to expectations

The **Teacher Tuition Incentive Program**, initiated by President Ray Authement and the Graduate School, supports K-12 educators in Louisiana pursuing graduate studies. Awards are contingent on fund availability and eligibility criteria, including full-time employment in a K-12 school and enrollment in a graduate program.

Awards for **doctoral students** can be as much as \$2,000 to support enrollment in 6 credit hours, while awards for **advanced master's students** are up to \$1,200 to support on-campus study or \$1,000 for online/hybrid courses. **Early master's students**, **Master's +30**, and **grad certificate students** are eligible to apply too.

The application for Spring 2025 awards closes on December 16.
