



### Students Opinions On College

**UCLA Williams Institute Study**  
In a 2019 survey, 75% of LGBTQ+ students at UCLA reported feeling safe on campus. However, 25% of LGBTQ+ students reported feeling unsafe on campus. This is a concerning trend that needs to be addressed.

• Both LGBTQ+ and non-LGBTQ+ students feel that they belong at their university.  
• However, queer students are less likely to recommend their program to others.  
• Queer students feel like they still are discriminated against even though they are not openly out.

**Conclusion**  
LGBTQ+ students are more likely to feel safe on campus than in the past. However, there is still a need for more support and resources for LGBTQ+ students.

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# Campus and College Climate Inclusivity!

## Background Information

• Many campuses in the United States are attempting to create a safer space for LGBTQ+ students.  
• In 2022, The UCLA Williams Institute held a study to see the experiences of queer students in college.  
• In 2020, the Association of American Universities held a study to see how many college students were queer.

## LGBTQ+

### Inclusivity of Students

**UCLA Williams Institute Study**  
32% of all international students report with harassment or bullying.  
• 19% being from the process of being  
• 22.2% being from college of their national home of being  
• 17.4% being from sexual harassment  
• 31.3% being from sexual assault

### Conclusion

• Less than half of students international experience bullying or harassment because they are LGBTQ+.  
• LGBTQ+ students are at higher risk of being bullied or harassed either directly or indirectly.

## Individuals On Campus

The Association of American Universities conducted a survey of 280,000 students nationwide.  
They found that nearly 17% of them identified as lesbian, gay, bisexual, or transgender. About one-third, 33% identified as Trans, Non-binary, or questioning.

**UCLA Williams Institute Study**  
32.2% of all international students  
19.4% of people had said they attended a 4-year college.

### Conclusion

LGBTQ+ students make up a small portion of the undergraduate population. However, LGBTQ+ people are over-represented in sexual violence.



## Practices On Our Campus

• 11.5% have been harassed or bullied on campus for all students, and those rates were for students to come out to their parents that are part of their community.  
• 12.1% believe that there is a lot of LGBTQ+ resources on their campus, and after gender equality training and accommodations supporting transgender students.  
• The school also offers a writing class "Project AHEAD" which helps transgender students to write about and form a group on campus that allows for safe and reducing stress on the job.  
• There's clubs that students can join to create a community of friends for themselves and others, such as GLAAD.

## Recommendations

• Create a Project AHEAD and reduce sexual discrimination between the LGBTQ+ students and create a safe and supportive environment.  
• Add more resources like individual and group counseling and support.  
• Training and Awareness: Provide training for faculty, staff, and others on LGBTQ+ issues to better understanding and support.  
• Gender Inequality: Through gender equality resources and training, reduce sexual discrimination on gender inequality.  
• LGBTQ+ Support: Provide resources for LGBTQ+ students, including support groups, counseling, and referrals.
