But we all know April doesn't exactly tiptoe in. For many of us, it's one of the busiest stretches of the year. Midterms. Deadlines. Conference travel. Thesis and dissertation crunch time. Add in teaching, mentoring, and professional commitments—plus spring allergies—and it's a lot.

That's why I was especially grateful to attend a talk last night that gave me both pause and perspective. Fumy Rita, Executive Director of LAGCOE and a two-time graduate of UL Lafayette's own Grad School, delivered a thoughtful message to our students—equal parts practical and powerful. As someone who's navigated both the classroom and the boardroom, her insights hit home. Let me share a few highlights I think are worth sitting with this April.

Study smarter, not just harder. Grades matter, yes—but so do relationships. Build them. Seek out mentors and, even more, sponsors—those who will say your name in rooms you haven't yet entered. As Fumy reminded us, important decisions about your life are often made when you're not in the room. Strategy and community are the infrastructure of success.

Advocate smarter. Know how systems work—on campus, in your field, and beyond. Your voice matters, especially when joined with others. Influence starts with understanding.

Avoid distractions. Fumy was candid here. It's easy to let "the scroll" steal your time so can reality TV. But she doesn't lose sight of what matters. "Likes don't build legacies," she said. "Focus builds freedom." Use those tech tools wisely.

Be strategic. You don't have to be everywhere—just effective where it counts. Presence without purpose can be exhausting. Choose where you show up, and why. That kind of intentionality is powerful.

And finally, be you. Know your craft, trust your preparation, and lead with your expertise. If a space doesn't value what you bring, it may not be the right fit. Your authenticity, paired with competence, is not a shortcoming—it's a superpower.

Whether you're on campus or logging in from across the state—or globe— I hope something in Fumy's words gives you what it gave me: a reset button for the month ahead.

PhD - More Than Just Three Letters: Navigating Challenges and Maximizing Opportunities

Each year, our Graduate Student Appreciation Week celebration includes a keynote address from one of our very own graduates. Writing Tips & Tools from Jamie Benner, Ph.D.

April brings shifts in the seasons and in the University community's focus—we turn our attention to semester deadlines and the culmination of the school year.

As our projects near completion, we must consider revision, editing, and proofreading. Editing—tightening and clarifying phrasing—and proofreading—correcting mistakes are end-of-project tasks often aided by Grammarly or Microsoft Word's editor feature. I also recommend reading your work aloud or having a text-to-speech program read it to you because hearing it spoken makes sentence-level issues more obvious.

If you're like me, revision—the process of re-envisioning a draft to enhance its organization and argument—is the most intimidating task. You must kill your darlings, removing pieces of the draft that don't develop your overall purpose, even if they're interesting or well-written.

Ask big picture questions: How well has this essay responded to its rhetorical situation? What is my purpose? Have I achieved it? **A REVERSE OUTLINE** will help answer these questions by breaking text into smaller, more digestible portions. This tool makes evaluating transitions and key ideas easier.

To create a reverse outline, write in the margins of a printed draft or use a blank document. Record each paragraph's main idea and how it advances your argument. Be brief. Then, review your reverse outline to see if each section aligns with your goals. Consider too what might be misplaced or missing.

Remember, you also can reverse outline the work of others—it's a great study tool and it can teach you a lot about structuring your own writing.

A **Climate Survey** is one way universities assess the experiences, needs, and concerns of students within an academic institution. In Spring 2023, the Graduate School conducted the first-ever graduate education climate survey on our campus. The feedback you provided is helping us make informed decisions aimed at enhancing grad student support, academic resources, and the overall graduate education experience at UL Lafayette.

Insights from the Graduate Education Climate Survey are informing investments and guiding meaningful action that directly benefit our graduate students, graduate faculty, and graduate programs. Here are a few examples:

- Increased Graduate Student Funding: As we prepared for 2024-2025, survey data on student funding concerns helped the Grad School advocate for the largest single-year investment in assistantships, fellowships, stipends, and teacher tuition incentive support in University history. Rest assured, we are still working to address this critical need.
- **Mentorship Development:** Survey results reinforced the need to provide more support for grad education mentors. The decision to invite Dr. Christine Pfund, an expert in mentorship who leads the <u>CIMER Institute</u> at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, to campus as part of the 125 celebration was informed by these climate survey findings. Partnership with other areas on campus is now focused on investing in mentorship training for graduate faculty.
- NCFDD Institutional Membership: In partnership with Academic Affairs and the Research Division, we have invested in an <u>NCFDD institutional membership</u> that provides external professional development training and support for every stage of the academic career--and it includes a dissertation success curriculum for advanced doctoral students. If you have not activated your membership and explored this important resource, now is the time to do so.
- Career Development Initiatives: Survey respondents called for more career guidance. Becoming one of only 40 grad schools partners in the A2i+ (Accelerate to Industry) network is but one way we're listening to this feedback. This program connects our grad students with employers, professional development, and career paths in industry as well as government and non-profit sectors.
- Mental Health and Well-being: Grad student mental health and well-being is a nationally-recognized area of concern, and survey responses confirmed that this it is an area of concern on our campus too. We've added the Director of the Office and Disability Services to the University Committee for Graduate Student Success and Retention, and <u>UWill</u> is another important resource now available 24/7 to grad students. UWill offers on-demand access to wellness resources, counseling sessions, and a crisis line that allows students to speak immediately with a mental health professional.
- Improving Awareness about Student Support Resources: The climate survey revealed a general lack of awareness among respondents about the University resources available to grad students. This newsletter (and especially its Key Resources for Grad Students on the last page of every issue) is one way we're trying to raise awareness. Inclusion of student resource offices during GSAW week programming is another effort to better connect students with campus support.
- New Academic & Manuscript Support Coordinator: The needs identified by our grad student respondents buttressed efforts to create the Academic and Manuscript Support Coordinator position in the Grad School. Dr. Jamie Benner now holds this position, and she is charged with providing grad students and grad programs direct assistance with dissertation, thesis, and synthesis project manuscript preparation. She'll also be key to other kinds of co-curricular academic and writing support in the future. Stay tuned!
