Welcome to a new academic year! Whether you're just beginning your grad journey or returning with goals in sight, I hope this Fall semester brings focus, momentum, and a few moments of surprise joy.

This summer, I learned a word from Professor Emeritus Lynda Frese that has stayed with me: mudita. It's a Sanskrit term meaning to take joy in someone else's success—not out of comparison, but out of shared pride and community. I feel that often as I watch grad students defend theses, win awards, and move into their next chapters. It's a joy and a privilege to witness.

Behind the scenes this summer, this joy was felt too as we finalized three major projects, all designed to make grad life at UL Lafayette a little clearer, more supported, and better connected:

- A brand-new Graduate Assistantship Handbook, created for both grad students and the supervisors who mentor you. It offers practical guidance, clear expectations, important policies, and tips for navigating the unique dual role of grad student and grad student employee.
- New guidance on the use of generative AI in graduate education research because these tools are evolving fast, and it's essential to engage with them thoughtfully and with disciplinary clarity (and faculty support).
- Updated guidelines for theses, dissertations, and synthesis project writers, so you know exactly what to expect when it's time to submit your defended manuscript.

Each of these resources reflects much collaboration, especially the new assistantship handbook. Faculty from across campus shaped it, and we're grateful to the Graduate Council and Associate Dean Paul Leberg for leading the effort. We hope these tools make your path a little smoother.

The Statistical Consulting Center offers statistical consulting to UL Lafayette grad students and faculty on research involving statistical methods.

Successful research requires planning. Contact Dr. Whitman and his team as early as possible as you plan and conduct your research. They will listen to your needs and work with you to understand the questions and objectives of your study. They will actively participate and help you formulate your problems in terms of statistical questions. They are ready to help you solve those problems, and work with you until the solutions are reasonable and understandable. They also will discuss with you what can, and cannot, be achieved using modern statistical methods.

Due to time limitations graduate students receive priority in scheduling.

Do NOT wait until the last minute to contact the Stats Center.

Writing Tips & Tools





The Graduate School's manuscript support team entered this semester on note of success—we published an updated version of the <u>Guidelines for the Preparation and Submission of Theses</u>, <u>Dissertations</u>, <u>and Synthesis Projects</u> adjusted to meet current student needs.

Here are a few resources you can find in the Fall 2025 update:

- · Guidance and examples for acknowledging funding sources,
- Guidance and resources on copyright protection,
- Guidance and resources on selecting and using a preferred scholarly name,
- Guidance and resources to support understanding of embargoes,
- Guidance on use and disclosure of generative AI in your scholarship, and
- Clarity on how to list committee members in theses, dissertations, and synthesis projects.

If you're interested in learning more about copyright, scholarly names, or manuscripts in general, I highly recommend perusing our Guidelines.

Perhaps the most significant addition is inclusion of the Graduate School's <u>guidance on the use of generative artificial intelligence (GAI) in graduate research</u>. When we say "generative artificial intelligence," we mean ChatGPT, Gemini, and all other programs that can generate portions of images, video, audio, text, or code. Permissible use requires transparency and disclosure, faculty engagement, and ethical use and awareness.

GAI tools rely on material obtained through methods that blur the lines of authorial consent. They can construct a draft, but that draft will fall victim to set configurations and data biases that the tool lacks the ability to recognize and overcome. Beyond accountability and authorship demands, important considerations involving copyright and intellectual property, data privacy and security, and plagiarism and academic integrity come into play when using GAI.

You are the author. You must accept responsibility for your work and any that tools you use. Read the guidance. Get familiar with academic and research expectations in your discipline. The knowledge will come in handy, and as you stretch your scholarly abilities, you will continue to advance and grow.

Poster Printing? We've got you covered!

Quick Summary: Did you know that the Grad School will cover the cost of printing your conference research poster? In partnership with the Student Government Association and Print & Ship, the Graduate School is making poster printing easier for grad students. Print & Ship is located on campus and is now home to the Grad School's poster printer. As funding permits, you can print one research poster—for presentation at an academic conference or research event—per semester. To use this service, complete the <u>Graduate School Poster Printing Request Form</u> and attach your 48"x36" PDF. Allow 3-5 business days for printing and pickup your poster at Print & Ship.
