Final Exams

When students return from spring break, there is often a tendency to “check out” until summer comes around. Passing finals though, is an important step towards crossing the finish line of summer!

One of the best things you can do to help your student prepare for final exams is to simply ask when their exams are. The last few weeks of class are filled with projects and deadlines, often leaving studying for finals pushed to the back burner. Asking your student about their final exam schedule helps them begin thinking about and planning for finals.
