## **Message from the Dean**

DR. MARY FARMER-KAISER

Along with some stellar grad students and faculty,
I spent time last week at the SREB Institute on Teaching
and Mentoring. It is a meeting and experience that refuels me.

Stephen Pruitt, president of the Southern Regional Education Board, quoted part of the poem "Our Deepest Fear" at the conference. While I have included an excerpt to the right here, take time to google it.

As I listened in this moment, and throughout the conference, I reflected much on the promise and power of our grad students, faculty, and the work that they have undertaken. Each of you has a purpose—your why—that led you to grad school, to research, and/or to teaching. That purpose is powerful. And it's easy to lose sight of that purpose, especially at this time of the semester. We're buried in the hard work that is grad school. We worry about not meeting expectations—both our own and those that others have of us. And, yes, we may even be frightened as we consider what happens next when we meet (or exceed) those big expectations.

## Spill the Beans with Dr. Davide Oppo

Last month's 'Spill the Beans' at Rêve Coffee Lab introduced Dr. Davide Oppo to a great group of students. Dr. Oppo, the Pioneer Production Endowed Professor of Geology, is the recipient of the 2023 AAPG Foundation Inspirational Geosciences Educator Award, and we got to learn firsthand what moved Gracie Babineaux, a PhD student in the Earth and Energy Sciences program, to nominate him for this recognition that honors faculty who have "creatively and with excellence inspired their geoscience students." Dr. Oppo shared stories about his professional journey that began in Italy, took him to Ireland, and ultimately landed him in Louisiana. Perhaps to no one's surprise, he listened intently to students' questions and provided meaningful, candid answers. We left inspired! Dr. Oppo, thank you for embracing the opportunity to help us foster, in your words, "a stronger connection between faculty and students, creating a more inclusive and engaging academic environment."

## **Money Matters: Roth IRAs**
