ENROLLMENT PROJECTIONS

The long-term enrollment target for UL Lafayette is 20,000 students by 2022. Enrollment strategies are necessary as state-mandated increases in admission standards implemented in Fall 2012 are anticipated to restrict enrollment growht. In the next five years we anticipate enrollment to have "recovered" to 17,000 students. A related challenge is that other universities in the state will face mandated increases in their admissions standards in Fall 2013, significantly intensifying competition for qualified in-state students. This situation, combined with unfavorable demographic trends (such as declining numbers of students at highschool ages), an unentrenched system for recruiting transfer students, strengthening of the LCTCS, and the rise of "consortial" programs will inhibit our ability to grow in the near-term as desired. Also notable is that new academic program development has been concentrated in adult degree completion options and on-line degrees. These students require little or no physical space on campus. Efforts to mitigate declining enrollment are being proactively implemented, both in the academic and in the enrollment management areas.

SURVEY OF COLLEGES

At the beginning of the master planning efforts each College Dean was asked to complete a survey to project there future needs based on current needs and future student enrollment. The results were then adjusted by the Academic Planning office to reflect the changes in enrollment standards being implemented in 2012.

The design team studied the findings using the Council of Educational Facility Planners International (CEFPI) document, Space Planning for Institutions of Higher Education. Based on these calculations we were able to determine the general space needs of the University.
